"You are the Messiah, the Son of the Living God!" "I believe, help my unbelief!" "Lord, if you are willing, you can make me clean." "And they were all amazed at the greatness of God, and marveled at all Jesus did." "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord, Hosanna in the highest!"

"Crucify him! Crucify him!" "But Peter denied it. 'Woman, I don't know him.'" "Judas, are you betraying the Son of Man with a kiss?" "And they said many other insulting things to him." "One of the criminals who hung there hurled insults at him: 'Aren't you the Messiah? Save yourself and us!'"

How did we get here? How did we go from praise, excitement, and hope... to insults, disappointment, and denial? When the road ahead seemed difficult, it seems that many forgot all Jesus had said and done. It's easy to remember God's goodness when life is going well. When prayers are answered, blessings are obvious, and joy overflows, we can see God's faithfulness to us. It's easy to praise Him when there's nothing going wrong and everything seems great. But, once life gets hard, it's easy to forget these good moments. Suddenly, God seems to be absent, and we begin to wonder if He was ever with us in the first place. Suffering has a way of clouding our vision, and we forget those moments when God was so clearly present. Even in the wilderness, the Israelites quickly forgot how God had delivered them from Egypt (Exodus 16:3). The disciples, after witnessing miracles, still panicked in the storm, forgetting Jesus was with them (Mark 4:35-41).

But, time and time again, the Bible tells us to remember. Remember what God has done for you. Remember how God has been faithful. Remember where God has been active in your life. Remember those moments where everything seemed so clear. "Remember your Creator in the days of your youth" (Eccles 12:1). "Remember that you were slaves in Egypt and that the Lord your God brought you out of there with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm" (Deu 5:15). "I will remember the deeds of the Lord; yes, I will remember Your wonders of old" (Ps 77:11). "This is my body given for you. Do this in remembrance of me" (Luke 22:19).

As we enter the month of April, we are heading into Holy Week. It is a journey from the joyful shouts of Palm Sunday, to the sorrow of Good Friday, to the unimaginable hope of Easter. Holy week calls us to remember. Remember God's faithfulness; remember what God has done!

We remember Palm Sunday, when the crowds cheered, "Hosanna!" welcoming Jesus as a king. Jesus is the fulfillment of God's promised Messiah, and Palm Sunday calls us to remember God's faithfulness in keeping His promises, Jesus' kingship, and the ways in which God's Kingdom is set apart from the world in humility, love, and peace. We remember the meal Jesus shared with his disciples on Maundy Thursday. "Do this in remembrance of me," he says. In the Lord's Supper, Christ is truly present, offering us grace, forgiveness, and unity as the body of Christ. Jesus gave us a new commandment: "Love one another as I have loved you."

We remember the suffering and death of Jesus on the cross on Good Friday. The cross shows us both the wisdom and love of God. While a king dying on a cross to save us rather than engaging in battle would seem foolish to the world, it reflects the ultimate wisdom of God that surpasses all our understanding. Jesus takes our sin on himself out of his great love for us, and he shows us who He is and the lengths he will go for us. God is not distant or uninvolved - He knows suffering, pain, and challenges beyond belief. He walks with us through our hardest moments because he, too, has been there.

We remember the resurrection of Jesus that we celebrate on Easter. This is the moment that changed everything! As Paul says in 1 Cor 15:14, "And if Christ has not been raised, then all our preaching is useless, and your faith is useless." Jesus, who had been crucified and buried, rose from the dead, defeating sin and death once and for all. The resurrection is the foundation of our hope, a promise of new life and victory over death. No matter the darkness we face, the light of Christ shines brighter. It is a day of rejoicing, as we proclaim, "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!" Easter calls us to live in the reality of the resurrection, to be transformed by the power of Christ's love, and to share the good news of his victory with the world. "He isn't here! He is risen from the dead! Remember what he told you" (Luke 24:6).

As we journey through Holy Week, we are reminded that even in the most difficult times, we are not alone, and God is faithful. And so we continue each year to return to the greatest story of all time ro remember God's goodness, promises, and grace. Christ's victory over the grave gives us hope, no matter the challenges we face. In moments of hardship, we hold fast to these truths, remembering that the same God who triumphed over death is with us, offering us strength, peace, and the promise of new life. Happy Easter! God Bless You!



CHRISTIAN CALENDAR APRIL DATES

April 13, 2025: The Feast of the Lord's Passion (Palm Sunday) Sunday before Easter.

This feast marks the beginning of Holy Week and recalls Jesus' entrance to Jerusalem. This marked the beginning of His Passion. His entry into Jerusalem is sometimes called the Triumphal Entry in anticipation of his victory of all spiritual powers. This day is also called Palm Sunday in recollection of the palm branches laid in his path of entry. Palm branches are commonly used in Christian gatherings.

April 16, 2025: Holy Wednesday Wednesday before Easter.

Holy Wednesday, or Spy Wednesday, commemorates the day of the betrayal of Christ by Judas.

April 17, 2025: Maundy Thursday Thursday before Easter.

"Maundy" comes from the Latin word Mandatum, which means "commandment." It recalls Jesus' words, "I give you a new commandment," in <u>John 13:31-35</u>. Maundy Thursday recalls the Jesus' washing the disciples' feet and gathering for the last supper.

April 18, 2025: Good Friday Friday before Easter.

Good Friday is a day of irony. Although it is a day of lament and quiet reflection upon our Savior's death for our sin, it is also "good" because we do not sorrow as people without hope. We often recount the "seven sayings" of Christ from the cross. A Tenebrae service may be held. The cross, a crown of thorns, a black veil, a tomb, and nails are common symbols.

April 19, 2025: Holy Saturday Saturday before Easter.

Holy Saturday remembers our Savior's burial and descent to the dead. On this day we remember that we need not fear to go where Christ has been, for there is no place left untouched by our Savior. Scriptures on the descent of Christ include the Gospel accounts of Christ's burial, Peter's description of the descent in 1 Peter 3:18-20 and 4:1-6, Psalm 31, Lamentations 3, and Job 14. This day marks the end of the Lenten season.

April 20, 2025: The Feast of the Lord's Resurrection The first Sunday after the first full moon following the Spring equinox.

The Feast of the Lord's Resurrection is also called Easter, Resurrection Sunday, and Passover. This is the most widely celebrated feast day by Christians around the world. In a sense, every Sunday of the year is a celebration of the risen Christ. The old English word Easter means "east" in reference to the dawning light of the sun. For the Church, Easter is the dawning of the Son of God. The Feast of Easter begins fifty days of celebration of the resurrection of our Savior Jesus Christ.

In the <u>Lutheran Churches</u>, the Gospel for Easter Monday concerns the <u>Road to Emmaus appearance</u>.

April 20 – June 7, 2025: Season of Easter Fifty days from Easter Day to Pentecost Day.

The season of Easter is a continued celebration of the resurrection of Jesus for fifty days. This is the final season of the Christian calendar.

EASTER FUN FACTS

Do you know why we celebrate with Easter eggs, Easter bunnies, lilies, and lambs?

Easter is the most important feast day in the Christian church, celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The feast day is "movable" and always falls on the first Sunday after the first full Moon after the spring equinox.

Easter Traditions

When you think of Easter—whether you're religious or not—which family traditions come to mind? We decorate homes with colored Easter eggs, put out baskets for the Easter bunny to fill, give Easter lilies as gifts, and even eat traditional foods, from lamb to ham to special sweet breads.

Why Do We Celebrate Easter with Eggs?

The oval-shaped egg has been a universal symbol in many religions across the millennia, symbolizing new life, rebirth, and fertility.

The origin of the Easter egg is based on the fertility lore of the Indo-European races. To our pre-Christian ancestors, it was a most startling event to see a new and live creature emerge from a seemingly dead object. The egg, to them, became a symbol of spring.

In Judaism, eggs are an important part of the Passover seder plate. For some Christians, the egg symbolizes the rock tomb out of which Christ emerged to the new life of his Resurrection. Also, there was a practical reason that eggs became popular on Easter: They were forbidden during the 40 days of Lent. However, chickens still laid eggs, so they were often collected and decorated.

In most countries, the eggs are stained in plain vegetable dye colors. Among Orthodox Christians, the faithful present each other with crimson eggs in honor of the blood of Christ. In parts of Eastern Europe, it's tradition to create intricate designs on the egg with wax or twine before coloring. Called *pysanki*, these special eggs are saved from year to year like symbolic heirlooms and can be seen seasonally in Ukrainian shops. In Germany and other countries, the eggs are pierced and made hollow so that they can be suspended from shrubs and trees during Easter Week—much like decorations on a Christmas tree.

Many countries have egg hunts and games, too. Plastic eggs are often filled with candy treats since it's the end of Lent. Every year in Washington, D.C., there is an egg-rolling party on the lawn of the White House. This custom is traced back to Sunday School picnics and parades at Easter in the years before the Civil War. At these picnics, the children amused themselves with a variety of games, and egg rolling was one of them.

What Does the Easter Bunny Have to Do with Easter?

Easter comes during spring and celebrates new life. What springtime animals better represent fertility than the rabbit or the hare, which produce so many offspring?

The rabbit symbolism had its origin in pre-Christian fertility lore, while the hare was the Egyptian symbol of fertility. The ancient Greeks thought that rabbits could reproduce as virgins, and in the early medieval times, the rabbit became associated with the Virgin Mary and commonly appeared in medieval art.

However, the "Easter Bunny," who visits children on Easter morning, was an invention of German Protestants; the *Osterhase* or "Easter Hare," brought eggs and sweets to "good children," in the same way that Santa Claus brought gifts to well-behaved youngsters.

The Easter Hare played this Santa Claus—like role at the start of the Easter season, judging whether or not children had been obedient to their parents. The symbolism is not particularly religious, but we can be reasonably certain that the Lutherans of long ago did not intend to teach their children about fertility. Like Santa Claus, the Easter Bunny is something fun to do with the kids.

The Easter Bunny followed German immigrants to the American colonies in the 18th century, and the folklore spread across the United States. Initially, children fashioned nests for their Easter Bunnies out of bonnets, hats, or boxes; eventually, these became the colorful Easter baskets that we use today!

Why is Lamb Popular at Easter?

Among the popular Easter symbols, the lamb is by far the most significant of this great feast. The lamb is said to symbolize Jesus, as it embodies purity and goodness but also represents sacrifice.

The lamb was a sacrifice made during the Jewish Passover, which is a holiday commemorating the passage of the "angel of death" over the homes of those who had smeared the blood of sacrificial lambs on their doorposts, thus sparing the firstborn sons. Roasted lamb shanks are an important part of the Passover seder plate; roasted leg of lamb is popular for Easter in Mediterranean countries such as Italy and Greece.

Jesus was crucified during Passover week and then made the ultimate sacrifice, his life. He is referred to as the "Lamb of God" and "our Passover lamb" in the Bible. During Easter, we celebrate Jesus' Passover from death to life.

The ancient tradition of the Paschal lamb also inspired the Christians' use of lamb meat as a popular food at Eastertime

Why Do We Eat Ham at Easter?

Since we're talking about the Easter lamb, let's not forget the Easter ham. It, too, is an age-old custom, handed down from pre-Christian times, to eat the meat of this animal on festive occasions, feast days, and weddings.

The pig is an ancient symbol of good luck and prosperity. In some popular German expressions, the word "pig" is synonymous with "good luck" (*Schwein haben*, i.e., "to have a pig"). In Hungary, the highest card (ace) in card games is called "pig" (*disznó*). Not too long ago, it was fashionable for men to wear little pig figurines as good luck charms on their watch Chains.

Easter Breads

Sweet bread is also a tradition, especially with the conclusion of Lent, a period when many people do not indulge in sweets. For Christians, the resurrected Christ is called "the bread of life" (John 6:35), in whom believers will find their daily spiritual sustenance.

In Russia and Austria, the sweet breads are often marked with a cross or image of a lamb. In Germany, the Easter bread is baked in loaves of twisted or braided strands (Osterstollen). Another kind of Austrian Easter bread is the Osterlaib (Easter loaf), a large, flat, round loaf marked with a cross or an image of the lamb. In Poland and other countries, folks enjoy a special cake called the Easter baba (Baba Wielkanocna).

In Greece, the traditional Easter bread is baked with a red-dyed egg on top, covered with two strips of dough in the form of a cross.

In Italy, the Easter bread is braided with eggs, symbolizing new life.

Hot Cross Buns

Hot cross buns, hot cross buns! Traditionally, this delicious, sweet bun was served on Good Friday. Good Friday marks the end of Lent and is the day that Jesus died on the cross. The sweet bun is marked with a cross to help the bread rise and as a visible sign that the bread was "blessed."


Easter Lily

The magnificent Easter lily, with its sheer white petals, symbolizes life, purity, innocence, joy, and peace. The beautiful white flowers of the lily related to these traits. Many ancient allegories connect the flower with motherhood

In early paintings, the Angel Gabriel is seen handing a bouquet of white lilies to the Virgin Mary. In other paintings, the saints are bringing vessels full of lilies to Mary and the baby Jesus. It is said that beautiful white lilies sprang up in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus wept in the last hours before he was betrayed by Judas. The lilies sprang up where drops of Christ's sweat fell to the ground in his final hours of sorrow.

The lilies from Christ's time were not the Easter lily that we know today. The lilies in Jesus' area were wild lilies of the valleys and fields. Still, our Easter lily serves as a reminder of the lilies mentioned frequently throughout the Bible. Easter lilies grace homes and churches each spring as a symbol of new life.

There are many other purely religious symbols that are related to the Lenten season: marking the forehead with ashes on Ash Wednesday, waving palms on <u>Palm Sunday</u>, and the symbolism of the crucifix (cross) on which Jesus died.



Psychologist William Worden stated that when faced with a loss, you are forced to make a choice between two alternatives:

- ⇒ Wallow in despair over what you have lost, wishing what has changed had never changed.
- ⇒ Engage with grief, which allows you to adapt and keep moving forward.

Engaging with grief is active. It provides the opportunity for storytelling, learning, finding support for yourself, being a support to others, growth, and healing.



The Four Tasks of Mourning - William Worden

Accept the Reality of the Loss

* While denial is a method of coping meant to allow you to slowly absorb the weight of the loss, it is not a place you can stay. Coming to terms with the reality of your loss is the first step in moving forward and healing.

Experience the Pain of Grief

* As a culture, we try so hard not to feel. However, avoidance compounds our grief. You have to give yourself the time and space to feel the way you feel. "You have to feel it to heal it."

Adjust to a World without Them

* You may feel like adjusting to life without them is in some way a betrayal. This reasoning can keep you "stuck" in your grief. You have to adjust and adapt to your new normal which involves reorienting and restructure what you do without your loved one being physically present.

Find a way to Remember and Stay Connected to Them while Moving Forward with Your Life

* Moving forward does not mean forgetting. It means finding a place for them, while leaving room for others. It is about cherishing their memory and sharing their legacy, while moving forward with your own life.
