

Epiphany is often the forgotten season in the church year. It gets wedged between the hype of Christmas and the reflective season of Lent. There's no major holiday in Epiphany to speak of, unless you count Valentine's Day, which would be cheating. There is also no set time for it. It can be as short as four weeks and as long as seven weeks. But we need this season, because to have an epiphany is to have an "AHA! Moment". No matter how long we've been following Jesus, these AHA moments feed our faith, and keep us open to the ongoing work of God in the world.

From week to week, Jesus' teaching and healing invite us to examine our own lives and what we value. Are we living in line with the ways of Jesus and his vision for this world and the next? We ask these questions of ourselves as a matter of faith, even hoping we can still be surprised by AHA moments of God's grace and love.

Much of February, we will witness how Jesus empowers those who others might discount, and we see how Jesus invites us to expand the ways we see God at work in our lives. We might ask ourselves, who is Jesus calling us to lift up and empower? How is Jesus working through you to offer hope to a neighbor who needs it? What are you willing to give so that others can experience full and abundant life – a life without fear, a life that enables them to be their full, God – given selves?

The power of Epiphany is that once we have experienced a holy AHA moment, we can't unsee it. We grow. We change. We become more of what and who God has created us to be. As a church, we do this together. We work together and celebrate the ever-expanding ways God works through us and our ministry partners. Each time we have the opportunity to connect with our partners, there are holy "AHA moments." Moments of learning and caring, moments of worship and shared faith in a God who is always expanding our understanding of grace, love, and community.

I invite you to be on the lookout for holy AHA moments this month and never underestimate the power of God to grow and shape us into the people of God we are continually called to be.

Presiding Bishop Eaton Issues Pastoral Message on Executive Orders

January 24, 2025

Dear church,

On Monday, our nation witnessed the peaceful transfer of power central to our democracy, followed by sweeping actions by the incoming Trump administration. Facing such changes, we receive guidance through Martin Luther's words in the Large Catechism.

In the fourth petition of the Lord's Prayer, where we pray "Give us this day our daily bread," Luther writes about the importance of praying for our leaders, asking God to grant them wisdom and strength. He also speaks to the responsibility of leaders to provide stability, sufficiency and equity, saying, "It would be very proper to place in the coat-of-arms of every pious prince a loaf of bread instead of a lion, or a wreath of rue, or to stamp it upon the coin, to remind both them and their subjects that by their office we have protection and peace, and that without them we could not eat and retain our daily bread."

This past week has been one of rapid and cascading change, from the inauguration of a new president and vice president to the flurry of activity in government orders and regulations. The policies and decisions reflected in this week's executive orders and regulatory changes have the potential to profoundly impact our lives, the well-being of our neighbors and the future of the planet. Therefore, I am concerned about the ways that many of the executive actions have created uncertainty and fear in our communities among neighbors struggling to survive, neighbors struggling to provide for their children, and neighbors struggling to be seen.

As a church, we are called to speak up when the government distorts or denies the image of God in each person by endangering access to protection, peace and daily bread. Where harm or inequity occur, we are called by God to respond with love and advocacy.

Luther also writes that in asking for daily bread, we are to pray for our leaders. We should pray that they act wisely and justly, protect all people and not cause harm.

Prayer is not passive; it's an act of hope. Prayer reminds us to ground ourselves in God's promise. We pray for strength, to love unconditionally and to serve one another. As we lift up our petitions, we must also act—advocating for policies that affirm the dignity of every person and standing against actions that demean or exclude.

This church is committed to upholding the humanity of everyone, regardless of who we are or where we come from. We are a church called to love our neighbors and accompany all people in their joys and struggles. We must remain steadfast in this calling. As the ELCA, we will continue to proclaim the radical inclusivity of Christ's love. And we will deepen our local and global partnerships with those working to build a just and compassionate society, especially through our ecumenical and interreligious networks.

I commend to you the social message "Government and Civic Engagement in the United States: Discipleship in a Democracy," which states on page 7: "To evaluate how well agencies of government are doing their proper work of providing for the safety and well-being of those within their borders and/or jurisdiction, Lutherans ask one simple but all-encompassing question: Is the neighbor being served?"

I encourage our congregations to use the resources of the <u>ELCA Witness in Society Team</u> with advocacy networks on the state and federal level. And get involved with <u>AMMPARO</u>, the ELCA's strategy toward just and humane policies affecting migrants.

As we move forward, let us hold fast to our faith and to one another. Let us be bold in our witness to the gospel, steadfast in our prayers for those in authority and tireless in our efforts to seek justice for all.

May God grant us courage, wisdom and peace in these days.



February is not explicitly mentioned in the Bible, but it corresponds to a time of winter and agricultural significance

Key biblical events that may align with February include the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple and potentially the beginning of Noah's Flood.

Spiritual themes for February often revolve around purification, preparation for Lent, love, and the gradual increase of light.

One event that some scholars associate with February is the presentation of Jesus in the Temple, known as the <u>Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary</u>. According to Jewish law, this would have occurred 40 days after Jesus' birth (Luke 2:22-38). If we accept the traditional date of December 25th for Christ's birth, then this event would fall on <u>February 2nd</u>, which is when many Christian traditions celebrate the Feast of the Presentation.

This event holds powerful spiritual significance. It marks the moment when Simeon, guided by the Holy Spirit, recognized the infant Jesus as the long-awaited Messiah, proclaiming Him as "a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel" (Luke 2:32). This recognition of Jesus as the light of the world aligns beautifully with February's position at the cusp of winter and spring, when the days begin to noticeably lengthen in the Northern Hemisphere.

Another event that some traditions place in February is the beginning of Noah's Flood. Although the Bible does not provide a specific date, some interpretations of the Hebrew calendar suggest that the rains may have begun in what corresponds to our late January or early February. This timing would align with the rainy season in the Middle East.

From a spiritual perspective, these events – whether or not they occurred precisely in February – offer us powerful lessons. The Presentation reminds us of the importance of dedicating our lives to God and recognizing Christ's light in our world. The story of Noah teaches us about faith, obedience, and God's promise of renewal after times of trial.

February is an opportunity to deepen your faith and prepare your heart for spiritual growth, much like the earth prepares for the new life of spring. While February may not be explicitly mentioned in Scripture, we can draw rich spiritual themes and lessons from this time of year, informed by both biblical wisdom and the rhythms of God's creation.

February often marks the deepest part of winter in many regions, yet beneath the surface, life is quietly preparing for spring's renewal. This natural cycle echoes the spiritual truth found in Isaiah 43:19, "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" February invites us to cultivate patience and hope, trusting in God's unseen work in our lives even in seasons that feel barren.

The theme of purification, associated with the Feast of the Presentation, is relevant. Just as Mary underwent ritual purification, we too are called to continual spiritual cleansing. As 1 John 1:9 reminds us, "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

February, with Valentine's Day, focuses on love. While this holiday isn't biblical, it can remind us of God's supreme love and our call to love others. As Jesus taught, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another" (John 13:34). Lastly, as the days begin to lengthen, February can symbolize the gradual increase of spiritual light in our lives. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness will have the light of life" (John 8:12). This month can inspire us to seek and reflect Christ's light more fully.

February's position at the end of winter in the Northern Hemisphere can be a metaphor for the Christian journey from darkness to light. As the days begin to lengthen, and we anticipate the coming of spring, we are reminded of the hope and new life through Jesus. This natural transition aligns beautifully with our spiritual progression during Lent to the Easter celebration. In the Christian context, this aligns with our teachings on sanctification and the ongoing process of being made holy through Christ. It reminds us that our faith journey is one of continuous growth and transformation.

Let us embrace February as a time to deepen our faith, prepare our hearts for the Lenten journey, and anticipate the new life and hope that Christ brings. May we use this month to draw closer to God and to one another in Christian love and fellowship.
