★ **May 16** is Armed Forces Day, which honors those who serve in all branches of the United States military.

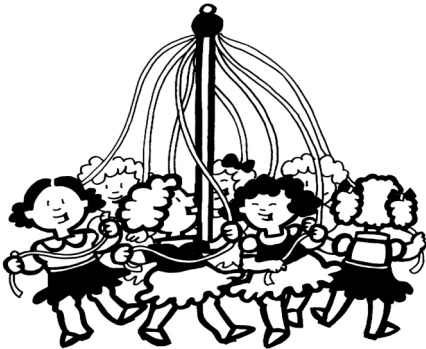
★ **May 18** is Victoria Day in Canada. This holiday celebrates the birthday of Queen Victoria, who was born on May 24, 1819

## **Scripture Reading: Luke 24:13-35**

Life is a journey that must be traveled no matter how bad the roads and accommodations. —Oliver Goldsmith

Some journeys in life are long, slow and sometimes difficult, unless we realize that the road itself is as meaningful as the destination.

Luke 24 tells us about two disciples making a pilgrimage. They were walking the seven miles from Jerusalem to Emmaus, discouraged after Jesus' death. Their hopes were shattered. But as they walked, a stranger joined them. He explained the Scriptures, reminding them of God's promises. Later, when they sat down to eat, the stranger broke bread — and suddenly their eyes were opened. It was Jesus himself, risen and alive!

This story shows us that faith is a journey, too. The journey may not involve long roads or mountains, but it's still real. Every day has its steps: time in prayer, a word of encouragement for others, patient endurance in hardship. And here is the good news: Jesus walks beside us, even when we don't immediately recognize him. He listens to our worries, opens our hearts, and strengthens our hope.

We're on our way to a holy destination — our eternal home with God. But we don't travel alone. Jesus is our companion, making himself known in the breaking of bread, in the reading of Scripture and in the quiet assurance of his presence.

So, when the road feels long, we keep walking in hope, knowing the risen Lord is with us.

**No matter how near, there's no place more comforting and more alive. —Philip Yancey**

If you've ever admired pictures of grand estates, you know just how vast Hollywood's mega mansions can be. For example, "The One" in Bel Air spans a staggering 105,000 square feet — so large that its developer once described it as "100,000 square feet of drywall." Another famous residence, "The Manor" in Holmby Hills, boasts 56,500 square feet of living space — larger than both the White House and the Taj Mahal. These homes, while impressive, are pale whispers of true permanence.

In John 14, Jesus comforts his disciples with a promise that dwarfs any earthly mansion: "In my Father's house there are many dwelling places ... I go to prepare a place for you." Jesus isn't talking about square footage or luxury. He's promising a home of peace, purpose and eternal belonging. How amazing is this! We may not return to grand homes we once knew, but our declining years are not meant to be a descent into isolation. Not to worry, Jesus says. Don't let your hearts be disturbed and all upset. Yes, he was speaking specifically about his imminent death, resurrection and departure from this world. The disciples needed to know, just as we do, that even though Jesus' physical presence would soon be gone, he wasn't abandoning them — nor has he abandoned us.

Here, in these verses, Jesus explicitly tells us that he will not forget us, that he has done all the estate planning necessary for our eternal home in glory! We are heirs of eternity, and someday we will be welcomed into an eternal home that will do nothing but astonish. So, let's be mindful of how we live.

Each day lived in faith is another brick laid in that divine dwelling prepared just for us. As we journey through days that may feel limited in scope, we can rest in the truth that our future home awaits — crafted by love, built from grace and already promised by the One who knows us intimately.

### **What are the birth flowers for May?**

The May birth flowers are lily of the valley and hawthorn, symbolizing purity, sweetness, and hope.

### **What does lily of the valley symbolize?**

Lily of the valley represents purity, humility, motherhood, and a return to happiness.

### **What does hawthorn symbolize?**

Hawthorn symbolizes hope, love, and protection, and is often associated with spring and renewal.

### **Are hawthorn berries edible?**

Yes, hawthorn berries can be eaten fresh or used in jellies and wines.

## **Lily-of-the-valley Meanings and Symbolism**

- In ancient astrology, Lily-of-the-valley was said to be protected by the son of the goddess Maia. In Greek mythology, that son was Hermes; for the Romans, it was Mercury.
- According to legend, Lily-of-the-valley fell in love with the song of the nightingale and only bloomed when the bird returned to the woods in May.
- It is also believed that Apollo created the ground cover flower for nymphs to walk on.
- This flower has been associated with motherhood, sweetness, purity, and humility. It signifies a return to happiness, likely due to its time of bloom and the anticipation of summer.
- In Christian lore, Lily-of-the-valley came to be from Eve's tears after she was expelled from the Garden of Eden. It has also been said that Lily-of-the-valley sprouted from the tears of Mary at the site of Christ's crucifixion.

## **Lily-of-the valley in History**

- In the 1500s, King Charles IX was gifted a Lily-of-the-valley for good luck on May Day, and each year following, he continued the tradition of gifting the flowers for luck.
- In France, the tradition of gifting Lily-of-the-valley continues as a symbol of good luck.
- In Serbia, Lily-of-the-valley is picked on St. George's feast day, and people decorate their homes with the flowers to bring about good luck and prosperity.
- The flower is mentioned numerous times in the Bible and has also been associated with Christ's second coming.
- Thomas Jefferson recorded the flower in a list of hardy perennials that grew at his Monticello home.
- Due to its sweet fragrance, Lily-of-the-valley is a popular choice for wedding bouquets. In Holland, newlyweds have been known to plant Lily-of-the-valley in their garden to bring about luck in their marriage. The flowers were also part of the bridal bouquets of Princess Diana and Kate Middleton.
- In Helston, England, the Lily-of-the-valley is worn during the Furry Dance, a centuries-old celebration observed on May 8 each year.
- Lily-of-the-valley is the national flower of Finland.

## Hawthorn Meanings and Symbolism

- Hawthorn have long been a symbol of hope. Other associations include its ability to mark the entrance to other worlds, with a strong connection to fairies.
- Ancient Greeks were said to use its branches during wedding processions, while in Celtic lore, Hawthorn was thought to heal a broken heart.
- According to Serbian lore, it was once believed that stakes made from Hawthorn could slay vampires.
- Hawthorn are associated with the pagan symbol of fertility.
- It was once thought that bringing a hawthorn blossom inside would be followed by illness and death. During medieval times, the smell of Hawthorn blossom was associated with the Great Plague. Many have believed that a Hawthorn's bloom marked the point of change from spring to summer.

## Hawthorn in History

The Hawthorn's link to May Day is undeniable. For this reason, it has been customary to decorate the celebration with flowering Hawthorn branches, most notably in the form of May Day garlands.

- In 1923, the white Hawthorn blossom was recognized as the state flower of Missouri.
- Hawthorn has been used for medicinal purposes for years, including to treat heart and blood diseases, as well as chest pains, blood pressure issues, and high cholesterol. The majority of its medicinal value is found in its fruit pigments.
- Hawthorn leaves and fruit are edible. When picked young, the leaves can be used in salads. The fruit can be eaten on its own or used to make jelly and wine.

The shrike—a type of bird—will impale its (already dead) prey onto a hawthorn's thorn, allowing the bird to eat more comfortably.

## **Rhubarb Pie**

### **Ingredients**

pastry for a double crust pie

1-1/4 cups sugar

1/4 cup cornstarch

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 bunch (1 pound) rhubarb cut in 1-1/2 inch lengths

2 teaspoon grated orange rind (or 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind)

juice of one orange

2 tablespoons butter

### **Instructions**

Divide the pastry (above) into unequal halves. Roll out the larger portion and fit into a 9-inch pie pan.

Trim the pastry 1/2 inch beyond the rim of the pan.

Roll out the remaining pastry to 1/8-inch thickness and cut into strips about 3/4 inch wide.

Mix the sugar, cornstarch, and salt. Add the rhubarb, rind, and juice and toss until well mixed. Tint pink if desired and turn into the pastry shell.

Dot with butter.

Arrange the pastry strips over the pie in a lattice pattern, securing it to the pie shell firmly and fluting the pie shell and strips together to form a high rim.

Brush the pastry with a little milk and sprinkle sugar over it.

Bake in a 400 degrees F oven for 50-60 minutes, or until the filling has bubbles that do not break.
