From Pastor Peggy

During October we will remember St. Francis on two Sundays. St. Francis was a friar of the church, who lived in Assisi, in what is now Italy during the 12th and 13th centuries. Francis believed that all nature mirrored the love of God and he reportedly preached sermons to even the birds and tamed a wolf. Although born into a merchant family (middle class) Francis took a vow of poverty and gained followers during his life, continuing to today. He also felt compassion for those who were ill or wounded and is said to have been instrumental in their healing, including those suffering from leprosy. At Christmas time in 1222, Francis recreated the first Nativity scene in a cave outside Greccio, Italy and invited people to celebrate. He was canonized (declared a saint by the Roman Catholic Church) in 1228, and in 1976, Pope John Paul the 2nd further declared him the patron saint of ecology. Many Lutheran Churches honor St. Francis with a blessing of the animals on a date close to his feast day, October 4th.

We will hold a blessing of pets on Sunday, October 15th during the worship service. You are invited to bring your well-behaved pet or a photo and Pastor Manny will call you forward for the blessing. On October 22nd we will hold a service of healing within our 10:00 worship service. You will be invited to come forward for anointing and prayer.

A famous quote from St. Francis is: "Start by doing what is necessary; then do what's possible; and suddenly you are doing the impossible."

Many of us also find comfort in the beautiful prayer that is attributed to St. Francis:

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace:

where there is hatred, let me sow love;

where there is injury, pardon;

where there is doubt, faith;

where there is despair, hope;

where there is darkness, light;

where there is sadness, joy.

O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek

to be consoled as to console.

to be understood as to understand,

to be loved as to love.

For it is in giving that we receive,

it is in pardoning that we are pardoned.

and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

join us for a light lunch at noon followed by communion at 1:00.



Folklore for the Season


- October is a great time for stargazing.

October's birth flowers are the cosmos and the calendula or marigold.


The calendula represents winning grace, grief, or chagrin
